

There once lived a real Dick Whittington who was the inspiration for the pantomime character we know and love today. But which bits of the story are true and which are made up?

During his lifetime, England fought a lot, sometimes against the Scots and French, but sometimes among its own people. There was a Peasants' Revolt in 1381, and King Henry V won the Battle of Agincourt against the French in 1415.

The real Richard Whittington lived in London in the Middle Ages. He was probably born in around 1354 and lived until 1423.

Richard was born in Gloucestershire, the younger son of a landowner. He went to London to become a mercer - someone who traded in luxury fabrics such as silk and velvet - which he was very good at and which made him rich.

He was made mayor of London by Richard II in 1397 and went on to be elected three more times.

He married Alice Fitzwarren in 1402 but they never had any children, and she died in 1411. He was popular with the king, Richard II, and lent him plenty of money - a tradition he carried on with later kings Henry IV and V.

He did lots of good things for London, such as paying for drains in poor areas, opening a ward for unmarried mothers, and building libraries and churches. In his will, he left a fund that still helps poor Londoners today.

he Facts

Whittington was put in charge of the the money spent on finishing the building of Westminster Abbey.

Dick Whittington first appeared onstage in England in around 1605, in a play called The History of Richard Whittington, of his lowe byrth, his great fortune.

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Dick's cat seems to be completely made up. There is no evidence he had one in real life, and the idea may have come from a Middle-Eastern folk story that was popular at the time the real Whittington lived.

FIGLION

The stage version of Dick comes from a poor home, but the real one's family was actually very wealthy. It also claims he was an orphan, but he wasn't.

Dick becomes a servant in the London house of Alderman Fitzwarren, where the cook is usually mean to him. In reality, the Fitzwarrens lived in a town miles outside London, and Dick was never a servant. He probably met and married Alderman Fitzwarren's daughter Alice when he was already mayor.

e Fiction

In the fictional version of the story, Dick is leaving London when he hears the sound of Bow bells telling him to "turn again". There's now a hospital on the site at Highgate Hill, where he's supposed to have been, called the Whittington Hospital. And there's a statue of his cat.

> King (or Queen) Rat was invented as a baddie for Dick and his cat to fight in the first pantomime version in 1814. This was when the Fairy of the Bells made her first appearance too.





PSSST! ... THEY'RE CHOCOLATE CHIPS REALLY

These are Idle Jack's favourite treats. Quick and simple to make, with no real effort needed, just the way he likes it!

INGREDIENTS

150g (5oz) of unsalted butter

- A little bit of margarine
- 6 tablespoons of golden syrup
- 200g (7oz) of soft brown sugar
- 350g (12oz) of rolled oats
- 200g (7oz) of dried apricots, finely chopped
- 110g (4oz) of flaked almonds

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4

2. Grease a baking tray with some margarine. The tray will need to be at least 20cm x 20cm x 3cm.

3. Place butter, syrup and sugar into a saucepan and let them melt over the hob

4. When everything has melted, stir in oats, apricots and almonds.

5. Next, pour out the mixture into the tray. You'll need to use a wooden spoon because it will be quite sticky by now.

5. Place the tray in the oven and bake for 15 minutes until the flapjacks turn golden.

6. Leave to cool for half an hour before cutting into cat shapes.



1. Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5.

2. Use an electric mixer (or a fork if you're feeling strong) to cream the butter with the brown and granulated sugar until it turns nice and fluffy.

- 3. Next, beat in the egg and add the vanilla extract.
- 4. Combine the dry ingredients in a separate bowl and then beat it into the butter mixture.
- 5. Stir in the chocolate chips.
- 6. Drop large spoonfuls onto a
 - greased baking tray. Remember to space them apart so they don't stick together.
- 7. Place the tray in the oven and bake for 10-12 minutes.
- 8. Leave them to cool down on a rack for half an hour.
